#### Health and wellbeing

People experiencing poverty are often in survival mode. It's important to make sure people have access to their basic needs: food and clean water, basic healthcare, support for mental health and access to support services.

Only then can people build hope and begin to take steps towards improving their situation

#### Housing and Community

That's why we support housing initiatives that focus on community, not just bricks and mortar.



#### **Education and Empowerment**

The best investment is in empowering people to help themselves.

That's why we support: formal education, vocational training, informal training such as life skills, micro-finance loans, start-up grants and employment programs.

## MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAIRMAN



This year we have once again been able to take teams of people to visit our charity partners here and overseas, to meet the people whose lives are being transformed and to have a transformation experience of their own. I personally joined a team to visit Zoe Child Rescue in Thailand including my own daughter and seven others from Melbourne. My daughter was deeply moved by the experience and able to shake off fears and anxieties that had been plaguing her post Covid.

At Payton Foundation we are deeply motivated by our:

1) Sense of moral responsibility to use our influence and resources to help others who are vulnerable and at risk.

2) Amazing opportunity to be a bridge, incubator and activator of generosity, partnering with others to see lives transformed and to experience this transformation ourselves.

We activate philanthropy in our networks of friends, clients, suppliers and co-workers by providing a curated selection of approved charities to support as well as opportunities for us all to connect with charities and beneficiaries directly.

By partnering with great organisations in the areas of **Health, Housing and Education** together we continue to be **empowering vulnerable lives and changing ours.** 

Our friends at Mainline Developments completed the home in Carrum Downs in record time, so we have been able to provide supported accommodation for 2 young women escaping domestic violence situations, 6 months earlier than expected. This \$650k project was wholly funded by the Carrum Downs and Marriott Waters Community Bank and we have been able to provide the governance and infrastructure for them to achieve their goal of providing supported housing.

Unfortunately our specialist disability project in Moe, while approved by council, fell victim to the rising costs of construction and is no longer viable. So we've had to pivot and we are now partnering with the Victorian Homeless Fund to build social housing on the site for the fastest growing cohort of homeless people – women over 55.

We have a number of new Social housing opportunities cooking and will announce more details of the same in due course.

I'm proud to announce that we have now given away more than \$1mil in the past twelve months, and that's thanks to all of you who have supported us with your donations and working with Payton Capital.

Thanks to my board and the team at the Foundation whose passion and expertise has enabled us to deliver on our vision. Thanks to all of our hard working charity partners for dedicating their lives for the cause of the vulnerable. And thank you, for getting involved and partnering with purpose!

### **Partnering in Health and Wellbeing**





### The Babes Project

The Babes Project provides social, emotional and practical support; empowering vulnerable mothers to overcome adversity and help their child thrive.

Every woman needs support, knowledge and an understanding ally to thrive in her motherhood. Unfortunately many expectant mothers face complex social factors, adversely impacting them and their babies.



### C.H.I.P.S

By the age of 16, two thirds of children experience a traumatic event, negatively impacting on their physical & mental health, learning, and connection to community.

Through a trauma informed approach, CHIPS works with children, their families and school communities to help care for the emotional and social needs of children and to establish on-going family support. CHIPS works to help these young lives become all they were intended to be.



### **Evolve Help Ukraine**

Supporting displaced Ukrainians rebuild their lives in Australia. The team help with practical and financial needs to gain long-term accommodation, employment and community connection. They assist with: housing, employment pathways, basic necessities, english lessons, community programs and support to process and grieve their experience in Ukraine.



### Southern Peninsula Community Support (SPCS)

SPCS provide crisis support, financial aid, material aid and case work to the most vulnerable and marginalised people living on the Southern Peninsula (Dromana to Portsea). This region has dire housing affordability issues, with the top 10 postcodes for rental increases in the past year.

Families can often face needs that fall through gaps in available funding. Their family support case worker can help with everything from income and entitlements assessment, household bills, budgeting, advocacy and negotiation, education and school issues, to getting connected to specialist support services.

### TRANSFORMED LIVES HEALTH AND WELLBEING

Kristina faced trauma and subsequent drug use prior to falling pregnant. Changing her life and preparing for her baby was made possible with the help of The Babes Project. Throughout her pregnancy, The Babes Project empowered Kristina to make positive lifestyle

choices and provided invaluable education about birth and parenting. The support she received was a lifeline that transformed her life and prepared her for the arrival of her baby.

The Babes Project created a loving village around Kristina and her son during those crucial early weeks. Together, they attended group sessions and Nana lunches, where Kristina discovered a safe community and gained the confidence to raise her son with love and care.

Graduating from The Babes Project program is a bittersweet moment. The dedicated team has been by Kristina's side, empowering and educating her to overcome challenges and flourish as a parent. The impact of this support became evident when Kristina and her 4 month old son graduated because they're doing so well. At their final group session she smiled and told the team parenting was "better than she thought it would be."

Founder and CEO Helen Parker OAM shared, "It's days like these that I'm thankful Babes exists. And I'm thankful for our supporters who help us be there for so many women who are facing challenging circumstances."

### **Partnering in Housing and Community**





### Bridge It

Bridge It provides young people exiting out-of-home care with a home, a community, and the support to thrive.

Focussing on the idea of a home rather than house; supporting young people to stabilise, develop living skills, and prepare for long-term housing.

### **Fusion Mornington Peninsula**

Fusion support young people and families through a community-based response. Educating, Accommodating, Supporting and Sharing Life. Fusion operates the only youth housing service (15 – 21) on the Mornington Peninsula. Fusion's live-in mentor model creates a family environment. They provide the stability and support to develop life skills we would normally learn at home, for example cooking, cleaning, budgeting etc. By providing early interventions for young people and families, Fusion is addressing many issues that trigger long-term homelessness.





### RUEL

RUEL care for impoverished children in the Philippines. The team manaage 3 orphanages, provide education, medical support and surgeries for children with treatable medical conditions and physical deformities. Most of the children's surgeries are for cleft lip and/or cleft palate, club feet or tumours. Through Ruel's nourishment program, hundreds of babies have been nursed back to health from the verge of death.

### **Payton Foundation Housing**

Thanks to a partnership with the Bendigo Bank Carrum Downs, we are providing supported housing for young people experiencing homelessness. Supported by Fusion, the house is shared by 2 young women. Since January 2023 3 young women (under 25) have been supported. One who has a toddler. We welcome discussions to replicate this model. Plans are in place to develop a site in Moe for long term social housing.

Furthermore, over the course of the year we have been able to provide the rent assistance to maintain housing for 2 at-risk families.



### TRANSFORMED LIVES HOUSING AND COMMUNITY

Behind every number, there's a story of a life transformed.

Tammy\* lived in foster care from age three. "I never really had a loving family; we didn't show love or do things as a normal family did; it was just a place to live."

Tammy's foster care broke down at the point she was needing the most support. "I was getting bullied at school, I started to self-harming and using drugs... I started stealing and skipping school, and I got pregnant."

Tammy found herself moving between houses, living with friends, and a friend's dad, until she didn't have anywhere else to go. She moved in with her biological mum who introduced her to ice. *"I got addicted. Because of that, I had a stroke."* 

After being hospitalised and experiencing costly hotel accommodation, Tammy turned to Bridge It. Unlike other agencies, she was supported by people with lived experience, taking the time to build trust. That made the difference.

Tammy learnt to trust people, she learnt to reflect on the future, to develop goals. The stability of housing and support of the Bridge It team helped her shift habits and self-belief.

"Every one of the residents who have transitioned through the program have exited into private rental or community housing; with the skills needed to maintain future housing and as a result will not enter into the homelessness system. Payton Foundation backed us before Bridge It even had a name. They shared our vision that young people deserve a home and we made this happen together." Carla Raynes, CEO of Bridge It.

### **Partnering in Education and Empowerment**







From infants to Elders, Children's Ground works with entire First Nations communities over a 25-year period. Designed with First Nations leaders, the evidence-based approach partners with whole communities to transform lives and 'Close the Gap'! Their approach is implemented across 5 key areas: learning, family health, economic development, community development and creative and cultural development.

### **Kibera Education Program**

Partnering with the team at Edmund Rice Centre Nairobi to form a new program, the Kibera Education Program provides education scholarships for siblings of children with a disability. This has grown to support the education of 150 children. An additional 100 students were aided through our support of a local school that was facing closure at the start of the year. We've implemented a range of additional support programs, including Saturday activities for education and mentorship, holiday programs that provide a safe environment with nutrition and integration, family support by offering start-up capital for small businesses, vocational opportunities, crisis assistance during events like the Covid pandemic, and merit-based support for tertiary education.



### Te-Kworo

Alice Achan (CEO in Uganda) grew up as a traditional African girl in northern Uganda. She established Te Kworo in 2002 to care for the wellbeing of girls who had escaped captivity by the Lord's Resistance Army, led by the infamous Joseph Kony. Most were aged only 12-16 years, were pregnant or had babies, and all had suffered unspeakable atrocities. Today, the work has expanded to include two girls' boarding schools, a maternal and child health centre and mobile health teams, a women's shelter, community prevention projects and social enterprise guest houses in two locations.



### **ZOE Child Rescue**

Zoe Child Rescue prevents, rescues, and restores the lives of trafficked children. Based in Thailand, Zoe work alongside government and law enforcement to rescue children & shut down child trafficking operations. When a rescued child is taken to ZOE, they begin their restoration journey. Children are placed in a safe home where they receive medical care, counselling, education, and unconditional love.

Payton Foundation funds the Vocational training program, equipping rescued child trafficking survivors with the skills they need to access jobs, reducing their vulnerability to re-trafficking.



### **TRANSFORMED LIVES** EDUCATION AND EMPOWERMENT

Behind every number, there's a story of a life transformed.

'It was time to take orders, so I handed her a piece of paper and a pen to jot down what drinks we'd be making. She took the paper and pen, then handed it to the other vocational trainer and said to her, "I don't know how to write."' Vocational Trainer

The gift of literacy is often take for granted. We don't usually remember the exact moment we learnt to read; it seemed to just happen.

For children rescued from slavery, the ability to read and write is the key to unlocking a future. It's a real-life skill that is the difference between realising their dreams and continuing to feel ashamed, useless, or unworthy.

What if you were unable to decipher the menu board or even recognise the buttons on the Point of Sale cash register? Can you imagine not being able to decode the labels on the different bags of coffee, or the name of each type of milk?

That was not the only challenge Bianca<sup>\*</sup>. She was very timid and shy. She had very little self esteem or confidence, and was scared of making mistakes. When Bianca was rescued and taken to ZOE, she began her restoration journey; placed in a safe home where she could receive medical care, counselling, education, and unconditional love.

> Bianca participated in the Vocational training program, equipping her with the skills needed to access jobs, reducing her vulnerability to re-trafficking. She completed her formal educational and found her voice and confidence.. Bianca learnt to confidently take orders, engage with people, and to reclaim her sense of self. Thanks to the support of our donors, we have ensured children like Bianca have a future.

## **PHILIPPINES** IMMERSION

In February 2023, our group of 6 embarked on a life-changing adventure; spending a week with our charity partner RUEL and seeing first-hand the impact of our partnership.

Their first stop was at The Mindoro Provincial Hospital, where they were introduced to children in dire need of cleft lip and palate surgeries. Thanks to our community of generous supporters, we were able to fund the surgeries, deliver food packages to a Mangyan tribe and gift bikes to children living at RUEL's home in Calapan.

"45 successful surgeries were performed over the first 48 hours of the trip, mostly on children under the age of 10. We felt the parent's anticipation and anxiety transform into joy and relief." - Luke Johnstone.

"When you turn up at someone's house you should bring something. We went and got 650kg of rice, a heap of sardines, other bits and pieces, and made a pack per family." - Ross Munns.

At RUEL's Children's Home in Calapan our group had the opportunity to meet the staff that make RUEL a home and were warmly welcomed by the children. Bridging the gap between worlds with the universal language of sport and laughter, we were immersed in an array of games – from basketball and netball to chasing one another. When we brought out the bike, a Tour de Philippines was soon underway, their little legs wobbling at first, but quickly gaining confidence.

Luke Johnstone, beautifully summed up the experience: "My biggest takeaway is how

little it takes to make one child so happy and to change their lives; whether it's a cleft lip surgery, a bike, or a simple act of kindness."

### Thailand

Dave Payton led the visit to ZOE Thailand, working on child trafficking prevention, rescue and restoration.One such child, Chivy shared, "The other trafficked children were whispering to one another, 'There's a place called ZOE, and if you get there, you will be safe. They said that ZOE was looking for kids just like us." ZOE rescued Chivy and her friend and is now helping to bring restoration to their precious lives.
